

Introduction

Welcome to Hogmoor Inclosure, a total of 54 hectares of green space set in the heart of Prince Philip Park, Whitehill & Bordon.

This beautiful wood and heathland is open to the public every day of the year and includes waymarked trails, a play and picnic area and café. The site is the third largest, suitable alternative natural greenspace (SANG) of its kind in the UK and offers circular routes in a natural area to reduce pressure on our precious heathland habitats known as Special Protection Area's (SPA).



EVENTS

ART INSTALLATIONS

Together with The Phoenix Theatre & Arts Centre, artist, David Lloyd was commissioned to design stunning gateways for the Inclosure. His work also included creating 20 hand carved waymarkers as well as several sentinels - bespoke life size sculptures carved from green timber felled from site, these stand guard over the Inclosure and represent the lives of the people who have lived here over the centuries. Local schools were consulted and their ideas form part of the design.



HERITAGE

Hogmoor Inclosure is part of the Royal Forest of Woolmer. In 1863 much of the land of Woolmer Forest, including Hogmoor Inclosure, was sold or leased by Her Majesty's Commissioners for Woods and Forests to the War Department. The Army Garrison in Aldershot needed to expand its training area. Two Army Camps were established at Bordon and at Longmoor in 1899.

To defend the Bordon Army complex during the Second World War, a 40mm-Bofors light anti-aircraft gun emplacement was built around 1943 within Hogmoor Inclosure and can still be seen. This is a rare surviving example of the fieldwork dugout type and a protected monument. Another important feature on site is the possible remains of a Bronze Age barrow towards the southern end of the Site with several protected bowl barrows in the nearby area.

Hogmoor Inclosure became the tracked vehicle testing ground for the School of Electrical and Mechanical Engineering from the 1960's. Much of the landscape seen today including ponds and cut-throughs were created by tank activity.

How to find us

By foot: Hogmoor Inclosure has several gated pedestrian entrances and can be accessed on foot from Hogmoor Rd, A325 Templars Way, Firgrove Road and Eastside Cottages.

By bike: Main entrance, off Hogmoor Rd, Whitehill, Bordon GU35 9HN. Cycle racks are available.

By bus: Bus stops are available along Hogmoor Road. A number of buses serve Hogmoor Inclosure. Visit www.traveline.info or call 0871 200 22 33

By train: The nearest train stations are Liphook (4.2 miles) and Bentley (4.8 miles)

By car: Hogmoor Road, Whitehill, Bordon GU35 9HN
Hogmoor Inclosure is a short drive from Whitehill & Bordon town centre, access to the Inclosure car park can be found along Hogmoor Road, just off the new A325. Look for the brown directional road signs

Car parking: Free car park with approximately 100 spaces including 5 disabled parking bays. The car park is for short term use by visitors of Hogmoor Inclosure only. Overnight parking is not permitted. For security the car park is locked overnight throughout the year.



TRAILS

Gilbert White Trail

Length: 1.8km or 1.1 miles
Grading: Easy
Partly surfaced path
Time: 22 minutes

Named after the famous local 18th century author and naturalist, the Gilbert White trail is perfect for a brisk short walk.



Reme Trail

Length: 2.1km or 1.3 miles
Grading: Moderate
Partly surfaced path
Time: 25 minutes

Celebrating the work of the famous Corps of Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers – REME for short who were based in Bordon. Follow the carved trail markers which reflect on the REME experience during the First World War.

Legion Trail

Length: 2.9km or 1.8 miles
Grading: Moderate
Partly surfaced path.
Time: 35 minutes

The longest of the three trails, the Legion Trail reminds us of the area's Roman history, which includes a Roman road that ran from Chichester to Silchester, the nearby location of the Battle of Woolmer in AD 296 organised to quell a local rebellion and the discovery of 2 hoards of Roman coins found in the locality. You will see Roman influence highlighted in sculptures and hand carved trail markers en route.



Green Loop

Length: 7km or 4.3 miles

The 'Green Loop' is an award winning 7km circular pedestrian and cycle route, part of which runs through Hogmoor Inclosure, connecting greenspaces and the new and existing community of Whitehill & Bordon.

Orienteering trails

Other nearby trails

Shipwrights Way

A 50 mile long distance path over the South Downs connecting Bentley Railway Station to Portsmouth Historic Dockyard and suitable for walkers, cyclists and horseriders.

Hangars Way

A 21 mile walking route connecting Alton Railway Station to Queen Elizabeth Country Park.

National Cycle Network Route 22

Aims to connect Banstead (near Epsom) to Yarmouth on the Isle of Wight.

FOREY POND

Longmoor Camp in Whitehill Parish was used as a training centre for military railway engineers during WWI and the army developed rail links from Longmoor to Bordon in 1910, running the line through Hogmoor Inclosure and creating Forey Pond by blocking the drainage within part of Hogmoor Inclosure. Today it is a perfect wetland haven for wildlife observation.

CYCLING

If you are a cyclist, you are in for a real treat. Peaceful woodland routes abound – ideal for quality time in the saddle and a perfect opportunity for little ones to gain experience and confidence using the car-free tracks.



RECREATION

The area covers a wide range of walks, where you can take quiet strolls and discover the beauty of the spectacular nature around you, or enjoy an energetic run. Hogmoor Inclosure is also perfect for walking your four-legged friend, and a place where dog walking groups can meet regularly. **We kindly ask that during bird breeding season (April – August) dogs are kept under close control to avoid disturbance to ground-nesting birds.**

BAT BUNKER & BAT MATERNITY ROOST

At the heart of our efforts to protect the bats habitat, lies a bat bunker, a bat maternity roost in the shape of a barn and several bat boxes located in the trees on site. These are important ways to support our bat population.

FLORA & FAUNA

A newly created heathland area has restored vital and rare habitat for wildlife. Look out for eye-catching purple and pink flowers open in late summer. This area supports important reptiles such as the grass snake, slow worm and common lizard, all of which are found in Hogmoor Inclosure. Dotted around the site are reptile refugia to help survey the population.

28 different species of birds have been recorded on site, including firecrest, sparrowhawk and ground-nesting woodlark.

The area is fantastic for invertebrates, with important bees, sawflies and wasps using the disturbed areas of ground and sandy banks.
